
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

Semantics, n.

Definition, n.

A statement of the exact meaning of a word.

What is meant by a word, concept, or action.






Boxes Metaphor



Disputed Words

- fewer / less
 - Fewer people have less patience for discussing semantics.
- anticipate / expect
 - She anticipated a difficult test...so she studied hard.
 - She expected a high grade...because she studied hard.
- literally, ironically, resources
- done / finished / complete
- best practice









Best, adj.
That which is the most excellent, outstanding, or desirable.



Practice, n.

The actual application or use of an idea, belief, or method.



Best Practice, n.

The most excellent, outstanding, or desirable application or use of an idea, belief, or method.



Best Practice, n.

Procedure that is accepted or prescribed as being correct or most effective.









Disputed Words

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
Same, but different

Distinction without a difference

An artificially created distinction where no real or meaningful distinction exists.



Same, but different



If there is no "real" difference, then what is the purpose of the distinction?



Life of a word

Neologism, n. A newly coined word or expression.



Life of a word

- unbirthday, noob, truthiness, neuroplasticity
- •Google, spam, cloud, ask
- •bully, awesome, awful
- •brunch, spork, done-done-done
- •fudgel, brabble, apricity



Strange Creatures

Tardigrade (Water Bear, Moss Piglet)

Water-dwelling, eight-legged, segmented micro-animals (about 0.5 mm when fully grown). Among the most resilient animals known. Can survive extreme temperatures, radiation, pressure, and the vacuum of space.



Geoduck

Species of very large, saltwater clam (mollusk). Native to the west coast of North America. Shell ranges from 15-20 cm. Has long "neck" or siphon that extends from the shell. Burrows deep in sand and shoots spouts of water at random intervals. Often bred and eaten.

Phrase deconstruction and analysis



Problem, n.

A matter or situation regarded as unwelcome or harmful and needing to be dealt with and overcome.



Problem, n.

A difference between things as desired and things as perceived. (Weinberg)



Bug, n.
An error in a computer program or system.



Bug, n.
Anything that bugs someone.
(Pettichord)

Relativism, n.

The doctrine that knowledge, truth, and morality exist in relation to culture, society, or historical context, and are not absolute.



Relative Rule


For any abstract X, X is X to some person, at some time.




Relative Rule

Describes the relationship between someone (who) and something (what) at sometime (when).











So what?

- •What we call "problems" might matter.
- •Remember that "problems" are relative (subjective).



Prevent, v.
Keep something from happening or arising.





Detect, v.

Discover or identify the presence or existence of.





- Can Al detect fake news?
- Locusts can detect cancer in humans
- New Video Tech Will Help Minnesota Police Detect Suspects






- Installation of technology to prevent rail crashes nears completion

- Mayo Clinic Study Uncovers Dietary Trick To Help Prevent Kidney Stones




Causality, n.
The relationship between cause and effect.
















So what?


- Potential effects of word choice.
- Consider causality and perspective.



Help, n.

Make it easier (for someone) to do something; improve (a situation or problem); be of benefit or assistance to.







So what?

- Inclusion or exclusion of the word "help" might change the meaning of the phrase.
- Consider the specific problem, and if detection or prevention of the problem can be done alone or if it requires assistance.



Helping Verbs, n.

Verbs that help the main verb in a sentence by extending its meaning; convey complicated shades of meaning.



Auxiliary Verbs, n.

A verb used in forming the tenses, moods, and voices of other verbs.



- Auxiliary verbs
 - do/don't present tense
 - did/didn't past tense



Modal Verbs, n.

An auxiliary verb that expresses necessity or possibility.



- Modal verbs
 - can/could ability, possibility
 - may/might permission, possibility
 - will/would request, consequence
 - must necessity, requirement
 - shall/should obligation, correctness, suggestion



- Testers [do] (help) [prevent|detect] problems
- Testers [didn't] (help) [prevent|detect] problems
- Testers [can] (help) [prevent|detect] problems
- Testers [may] (help) [prevent | detect] problems
- Testers [will] (help) [prevent|detect] problems
- Testers [must] (help) [prevent|detect] problems
- Testers [should] (help) [prevent|detect] problems



Descriptive Statement, n.

Makes an assertion based on empirical evidence; facts.



Normative Statement, n.

Expresses a value judgement; opinions.



Descriptive is an eleven-letter word.

Normative is a better word.



So what?

- Identify the helping verb used (or omitted/implied) to better understand what might actually be meant.
- Consider if it is a statement of fact or opinion.



Testing, n.

The process of evaluating a product by learning about it through exploration and experimentation, which includes to some degree: questioning, study, modeling, observation, inference, etc. (RST)



Testing, n.

An investigation conducted to provide stakeholders with information about the quality of the product or service under test. (Kaner)



Testing, n.

Utilizing various tools and approaches in some combination and to some degree to help evaluate quality characteristics via exploration and experimentation often to obtain pertinent, useful information and provide it to relevant stakeholders to enable more informed, confident decisions which may also indirectly lead to increased quality.



Tester, n.
One who performs testing.







So what?

- The definition of "testing" might change the meaning of the phrase.
- Consider the actions performed to better understand the accuracy of the phrase.



- Testers detect defects
- Testers don't prevent problems
- Testers must help detect bugs
- Testers should help prevent bugs
- Testers can prevent failures
- Testers can't help prevent issues



Summary


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
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
