Principle 2: Identify your Audience

Personas

“Rob is a non technical visual learner who needs to justify expenses”

“Kim is detail-oriented reader who needs to understand the application before she downloads it”

Principle 3: Reduce, reuse, recycle

Find ways to Reuse your documentation

Principle 3: Reduce, reuse, recycle

Examples:

User stories + Acceptance Criteria = User Manual

Principle 3: Reduce, reuse, recycle

NOTE: Reusing requires editing because of micro decisions that happen in development

Principle 4: Pictures over words

- Napkin
- Whiteboard

- Interactive mockups (figma, sketch, XD)

Principle 5: No formulas~~√x~~

Questions to ask:

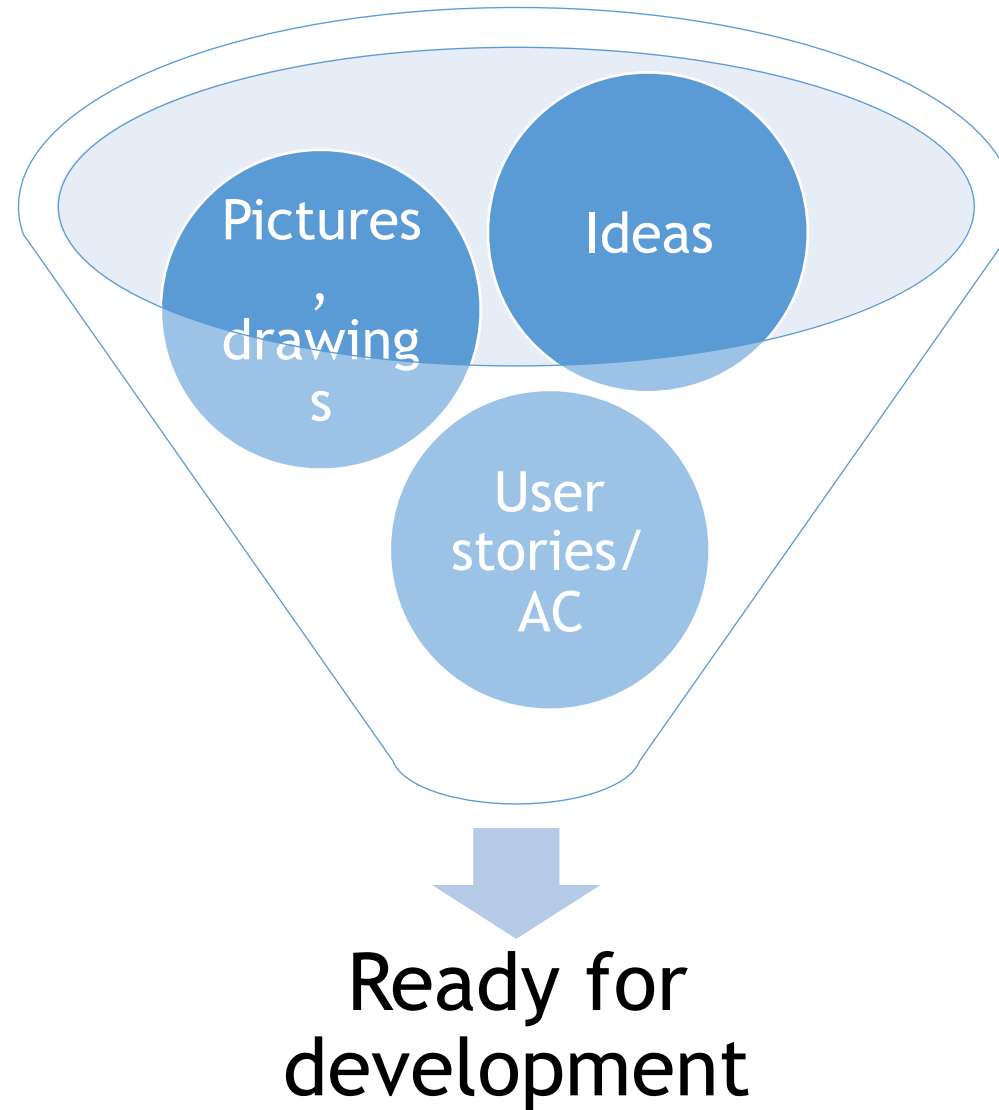
Are there specifications that need to be remembered? By who?

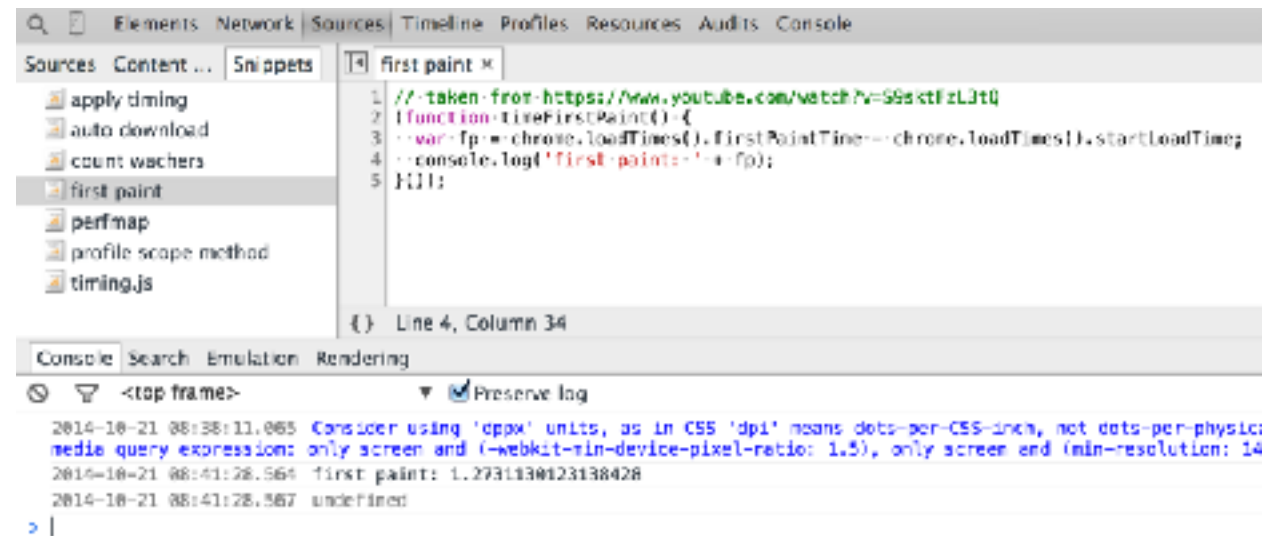
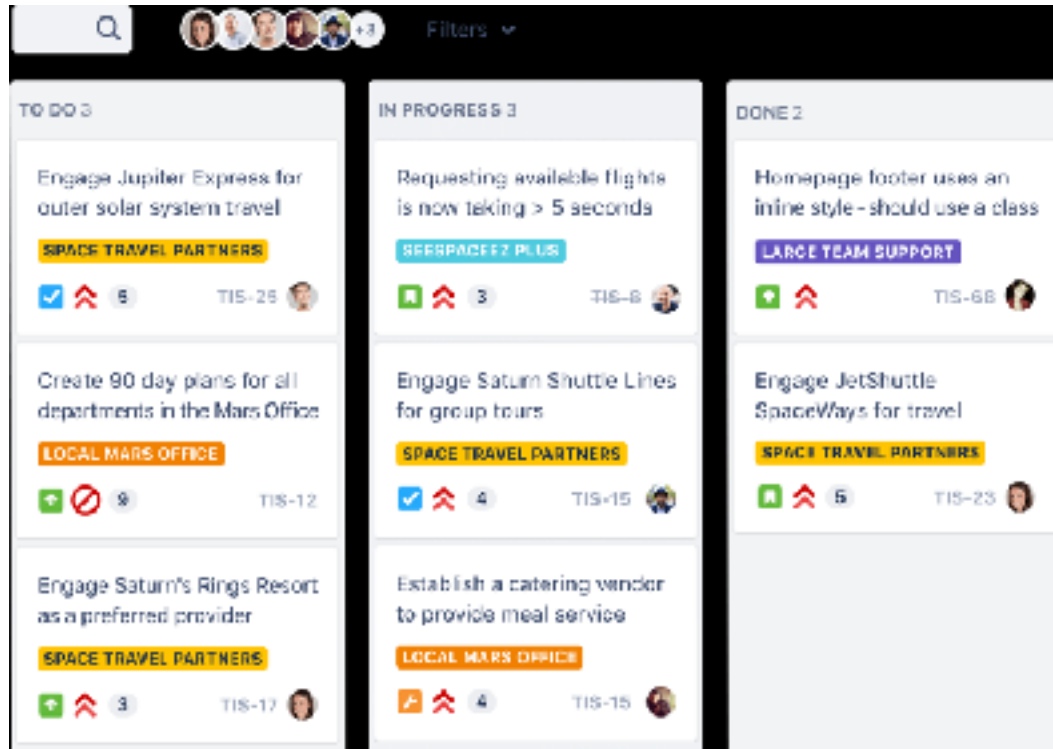

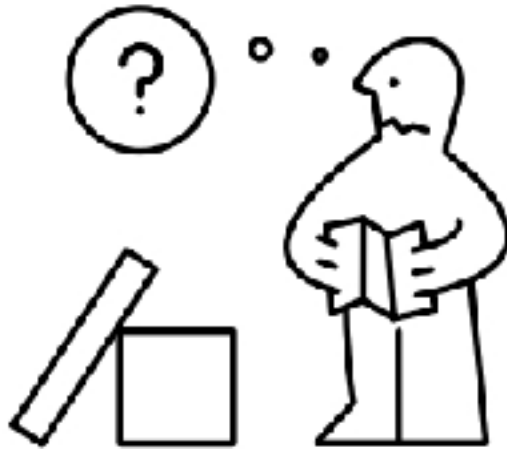
